### **Duplicate Bridge is a Timed Event**

Here are some tips to help everyone maintain an appropriate pace of play:

- Be friendly, courteous and engaging when new players arrive, but save long stories for after the game.
- If you're sitting N/S, have South maintain a personal scorecard while North enters the information into the Bridgemates.
- If you fall behind due to the difficulty of a particular board, make a conscious effort to make up the time on the next board.
- When the round is called, move all completed boards to the next lower table even if you're still playing one. This will allow them to begin on time.

#### Call the Director When ...

Calling the director is NOT putting someone on report. It's a process that's been developed over the years to ensure everyone enjoys the game and that the game is

played consistently across the country. So, please call the director whenever someone is interfering with your enjoyment of the game or whenever an irregularity occurs, no matter how simple or insignificant. And do so with a "Director, please" call.

Example: You should call the Director anytime a claim is made and disputed. When that occurs, it's not correct to say "let's play it out."

### **Continuing Education**

Most of the year, Mike Sears gives a mini-lesson on Thursdays from 11:30-12:15. It's an impromptu session, discussing topics and/or hands that attending players would like to discuss . . . and it's free! In the fall, Mike has a class for those who may have played many years ago and now would like to transition to modern bridge, and for those who are just beginning to learn the game. If you know folks who might be interested in this class, please provide their name and contact information to the club so that we can contact them when the schedule for this class is determined.

Here's a tip from one of Mike's sessions: When defending a contract, determining the opening lead is quite often difficult. Mike's recommendation on this topic in order is:

- Lead your suit if there's good reason to do so. If not . . .
- Lead your partner's bid suit. If your partner did not bid . . .
- Lead the top of a sequence you have in your hand. Don't have one . . .
- Against a NT contract without reason to do otherwise, lead a major.
- Against a suit contract, if you have 4 trump, lead a singleton or doubleton.
- If none of the above, try to make a "safe" lead (one that does not give the declarer a "free" trick); trump is often ok.
- Do not lead the "ace from space" (A-x-x) unless you're defending a slam contract. Might be ok there.



# For Newbies and Beyond...Explaining the ACBL Standard American Yellow Card

The Convention Card documents are the agreements partners have with each other at the bridge table. In tournaments, each player is required to have one, and it's required to be exactly the same as their partner's. The Standard American Yellow Card (SAYC) was created to provide a simple yet modern set of agreements. Because of this simple, modern approach, it's particularly useful for Novice/Intermediate players, for players who play together only infrequently, and for players meeting to play for the very first time, including on the internet. If you'd like to try using these agreements, let us know and we'll provide you a SAYC.
